### Message from the Administrator

All is well at Circle Drive Special Care Home. We survived the winter and now we are entering in to spring cleaning season. On May 7th we started the process of cleaning up all the gravel we put down during the winter; it sure seems like there is a lot more this year than last year.

We have had a changeover in our Accounting staff. After being with us for over 10 years, our accountant Linda made the decision to retire; her last day was at the end of April. We appreciate her years with us and wish her all the best in the years to come. Our new accountant, Jade, is not unfamiliar with Long Term Care, as she has been working in Long Term Care for over 10 years. We welcome her to our team and look forward to a long term working relationship with her.

We are only a month away from our Walk & Roll-a-Thon which is being held on Father's Day weekend. This year we continue to raise funds for the repairs needed to our C/D Solarium. The work involves reroofing and modifying the glass walls and ceilings so they don't leak every time it rains. This project should be commencing soon.

April 1st is the start of our new fiscal year in health care and the Ministry has promised new money in the budget and yes, there was. There was roughly \$200 million in new funding for Mental Health, the Children's Hospital and some Home Care programs, all important sectors of health care. Unfortunately, there was no new money allocated to Long Term Care so we continue to be mindful of our budget and trusting that we have no serious breakdowns in our equipment and facility. Please don't get me wrong, God has always provided for our home. So we will continue to pray and thank Him for His provision and

we will continue to be blessed by Him as we give Him all the glory.

Talk about being blessed, the Government came through this year with their Canada Summer Job Grant and they gave us funding for four students. We are hiring two Continuing Care Assistants, one Recreation Worker and one Food Services Worker to work with us this summer and that is wonderful for us and for them as they can earn money and experience towards their educational goals.

At Circle Drive Place, our sister operation, which is an independent living facility, things are going well. There are flooring projects happening this summer. Some high traffic areas are requiring a bit of tender loving care. This past September we accepted new applications through the month, something we haven't done for three years. The waiting list is back up to 250 active names. We have less than a 10% turnover on 102 suites so it does takes a while to go through the list.

I would like to thank everyone for all you do to make our home a better place. Whether you volunteer time feeding or visiting with our residents or contribute financially, you are truly a blessing. My prayer for you is that God will bless you tenfold. Everyone have a great summer and please, be safe.
