Message from the Administrator



These are unprecedented times. Whoever thought that a new strain of the common cold would shut the world down? It's been two months since we have had to lock our doors and not allow family, friends or other visitors enter our facility to visit with their loved ones. This has been extremely difficult on all involved including our staff. Their workload has greatly increased now that families and volunteers aren't here bringing their assistance with things such

as feeding residents during mealtimes and assisting with Physio.

Between the demands from the Sask Health Authority and Public Health the time at my desk has tripled. New projects are created and implemented right away and then we figure out how to make them work. It has definitely been a challenge.

Our residents are doing great even though they miss seeing their families. Our Recreation Department has been doing an awesome job at keeping everyone busy while maintaining distancing. If you aren't already doing so, you might consider following us on Facebook, it will bring a smile to your face.

It is our primary goal that Covid-19 doesn't get into our home. Our staff is only allowed to work in one facility. They are self-screening, including temperature checks as they come into work and also when they leave at the end of their shifts.

Now that the nice weather is here we are faced with how to get our residents outside and still be protected. They all have the same thoughts as you and I do when spring comes, "Get me outside!" Due to the no visitor rule we won't be able to take them out to our front deck area. So now we will be using our inner courtyards and a secluded deck area that we have. Hopefully some of these restrictions will be lifted by July and our lives can go back to almost normal. In the province's removal of restrictions plan, Long Term Care is one of the last groups to have their restrictions lifted.

Our neighbours at Circle Drive Place have had visitor restrictions in place since March, too. They also make sure that anyone coming into the building utilizes the hand sanitizing station both coming in and exiting. We have sanitizer at each of the exits and the residents have created multiple teams that weekly disinfect the building. They are serious about keeping Covid out of their homes. They are doing an amazing job.

In other news, our home has been approved for a new digital Call Bell System which was to commence in March but will more likely be installed in late summer. We will be

starting a two phase rebuild of our A/B Solarium. Phase one is tearing down the 34 year old structure and replacing the glass roof with a new roof and proper windows on the wall. Phase two will be next year and we will be replacing the tar and gravel roof that is above the solarium with a new torch on roof. Both of these phases will cost around \$16,000 each and will require us to fundraise. So this year's Walk & Roll-a-Thon in June will have its proceeds used for this project. Another project that we would like to conclude this summer is the completion of the east side of our main entrance. We are installing paving stones and planters along with sod in that area. It will look amazing.

In closing I would like to thank all of our Families for entrusting us to care for your loved ones during this very trying time. The responsibility to make sure your family member is safe from any virus puts a lot of stress on us and we are doing what we can to prevail. But know this, we can't do it without the tremendous sacrifice that you have made to stay away from our Home and your loved one.

Please pray for protection over our Home, our Staff and our Families.

Elizabeth (Betty) Penny was born in Regina, Saskatchewan on April 30,1932 and just had her 88th birthday a few days ago. She attended her primary school years at Aurora, a country school, ten miles east of Regina. A comment from one of her Grade 2 teachers was "Betty Lou is a very clever little girl and a great favourite with us all."

The Evoy family farm was located one mile south of Highway #1 where they lived in the summer time. Betty and her younger sister Mae loved to ride their horse, Bess, around the countryside. She attended Central High School but later finished high school by correspondence as the family moved to the farm year round. After high school, she completed her business course at Success Business College in Regina

and became proficient in typing (80 WPM) and shorthand (100 WPM). Her first job was as a teller at the Royal Bank.

In 1952, she met her future husband Raymond Penny and they were married at Westminster United Church in Regina in September, 1954. They relocated to Saskatoon in 1958, and had four children David (Maryann), Catherine (Duane), Linda (Mike) and Susan (Martin). "Grandma" "Grandma Beet" was always ready, willing and happy to help out with her seven grandchildren, Matthew, Tara, Taylor, Ryan, Nicole, Tori and Shawn. She is a proud and loving Mom and Grandma with a quick wit and sense of humor. She always welcomed her children and their spouses into her home with open arms!

Betty has always had an artistic flare and loved to paint with oil and mostly painted landscapes and still life pictures. We featured her paintings on Circle Drive Special Care Home's Creative Art wall. Betty was always very happy crafting her ceramics with her kiln in the basement. She liked to golf and bowl. She loved to bake and is famous for her homemade buns! Betty and Ray sang beautifully together while Ray played the piano or guitar. Betty and Ray traveled extensively coast to coast in Canada and to many destinations in the United States. They enjoyed spending some winter months in their home in Brownsville, Texas. They also traveled to Portugal and Costa Rica. Betty moved to Circle Drive in March of 2019.


Recreation News

AB Solarium

The AB solarium is used by residents and their families, nursing students and their instructors, and individuals who crave the warmth of the noonday sun. Sometimes the solarium is transformed with balloons, banners, streamers and good food when a resident is celebrating an anniversary or a significant birthday.

Residents gather for Council meetings and Bible studies and families visit in private comfort instead of meeting in the Resident's bedroom.

After 34 years, the wallpaper and windows need to be replaced. New blinds, flooring, furniture and fixtures are required. The estimated replacement cost is approximately \$32,000.00.

The solarium opens onto a courtyard filled with shrubs, evergreens, and natural growth. For the past number of years a duck has made a nest and raised her ducklings in the safety of the courtyard. You may have seen our ducks on Global TV as a few years ago the station sent a reporter to record our administrator guiding the ducklings through the walkway into freedom

We are a faith-based home. We praise God for every gift and we pray that funds will be forthcoming to update our solarium.
